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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Board of Directors Respective Solutions Group, Inc. Ebensburg, PA

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Respective Solutions Group, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2021 and 2020, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Respective Solutions Group, Inc. as of June 30, 2021 and 2020, and the changes in its net assets, functional expenses and cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance), and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report December 6, 2021, on our consideration of Respective Solutions Group, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. RESPECTIVE SOLUTIONS GROUP, INC. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2021 AND 2020

NOTE 1 NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

Respective Solutions Group, Inc. is a nonprofit organization helping young people successfully learn, stay in school, and prepare for life, the Organization rallies community resources, links students and their families to the appropriate services, and then follows up on the students' progress and participation.

NOTE 2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

The Organization is exempt from Federal income tax as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In addition, the Organization has been determined by the Internal Revenue Service not to be a "private foundation" within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. There was no unrelated business income for the years ended June 30, 2021 or 2020.

Basis of Accounting

The Organization prepares its financial statements on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accounting Pronouncements Adopted

In May 2014, the FASB issued ASU 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers. This standard implements a single framework for recognition of all revenue earned from customers. This framework ensures that entities appropriately reflect the consideration to which they expect to be entitled in exchange for goods and services by allocating transaction price to identified performance obligations and recognizing revenue as performance obligations are satisfied. Qualitative and quantitative disclosures are required to enable users of financial statements to understand the nature, amount, timing, and uncertainty of revenue and cash flows arising from contracts with customers. The Organization has adopted ASU 2014-09 for the year ended June 30, 2021. The adoption of this standard had no effect on previously reported amounts.

Revenue Recognition

The majority of the revenue the Organization earns consists primarily of (i) grants and (ii) contributions.

Grants: The Organization receives nearly all of its support under grants and contracts with various governmental agencies and private foundations. Grant income is recorded as an increase in net assets without donor restrictions when expenditures are incurred in the same fiscal year the support is received. Support received in excess of expenditures incurred is recorded as a liability, as deferred revenue.

Contributions: Contributions are accounted for following FASB ASC Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. In accordance with the FASB ASC, contributions received are recorded as contributions with donor restrictions or contributions without donor restrictions depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions. Support that is restricted by the donor is reported as an increase in net assets without donor restrictions if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statement of Activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Donated facilities are accounting for following FASB ASC Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. See Note 6 for more information on donated facilities.

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions

Net assets without donor restrictions are available for use at the discretion of the Board of Directors (the Board) and/or management for general operating purposes. From time to time, the Board designates a portion of these net assets for specific purposes which makes them unavailable for use at management's discretion.

See Note 5 for more information on the composition of net assets without donor restrictions.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions

Net assets with donor restrictions consist of assets whose use is limited by donor-imposed, time and/or purpose restrictions.

The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets as revenue with donor restrictions if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, the net assets are reclassified as net assets without donor restriction and reported in the statements of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Some net assets with donor restrictions include a stipulation that assets provided by maintained permanently (perpetual in nature) while permitting the Organization to expend the income generated by the assets in accordance with the provisions of additional donor imposed stipulations or a Board approved spending policy.

As of June 30, 2021, the Organization had no net assets with donor restrictions.

Equipment

Large equipment purchases are capitalized and recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed over five to ten (5-10) years using the straight-line method.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, Respective Solutions Group, Inc. considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three (3) months or less to be cash equivalents.

Federal Income Tax Status

Respective Solutions Group, Inc. is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a charitable organization whereby only unrelated business income, as defined by Section 509(a)(1) of the Code, is subject to federal income tax. However, income from certain activities not directly related to Respective Solutions Group, Inc.'s tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 509(a) 170(b)(1)(A)(vi) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation.

Respective Solutions Group, Inc. follows ASC Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes. The FASB ASC requires Respective Solutions Group, Inc. to evaluate tax positions taken and determine whether it is more-likely-than-not that the tax position will be sustained upon examination based on the technical merits of the position. The Organization has performed an evaluation and has determined there are no material unrecognized tax positions or uncertain tax positions that meet the reporting and disclosure provisions of the ASC. The Organization records tax penalties and interest as they occur. For the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, Respective Solutions Group, Inc. incurred no tax penalty or interest costs.

The Organization is subject to routine audits by taking jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress. The Organization believes it is no longer subject to income tax examinations for years prior to 2017.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Allowance for Uncollectible Receivables

The Organization uses the direct write-off method for uncollectible accounts based on collection history and management's review of the aged receivable balances at year end. As of June 30, 2021 and 2020, accounts receivable are primarily from grant sources and are deemed to be fully collectible.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Certain financial instruments are required to be recorded at fair value. The estimated fair values of such financial instructions (including cash and cash equivalents, certain debt instruments, and other assets and liabilities) have been valued using market or cost information where appropriate. Changes in assumptions or estimation methods could affect the fair value estimates. However, management does not believe any such changes would have a material impact on the financial condition, results of operations or cash flows of the Organization. Financial instruments, including cash and cash equivalents, other assets and short-term and long-term debt, are carried at cost, which approximates fair value.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In February 2016, the FASB issued ASU 2016-2, Leases (Topic 842). The main difference between previous GAAP and Topic 842 is the recognition of lease assets and lease liabilities by lessees for those leases classified as operating leases under previous GAAP. The guidance aims to increase transparency and comparability among organizations by recognizing lease assets and lease liabilities on the balance sheet and disclosing key information about leasing arrangements. The standard is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021 and should be applied on a retrospective basis in the year it is first applied. The Organization is evaluating the impact the adoption of this standard will have on the financial statements beginning in fiscal year 2023.

NOTE 3 LINE OF CREDIT

The Organization maintains a \$250,000 line of credit with a financial institution. The line of credit is secured with the assignment of the Organization's grant funds. The amount outstanding on the line of credit at June 30, 2021 and 2020, amounted to \$184,311 and \$238,732, respectively. The interest rate on the line of credit, which is due on demand, was 4.25% at June 30, 2021.

NOTE 4 LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF RESOURCES

As of June 30, 2021, financial assets and liquidity resources available within one (1) year for general expenditures, such as operating expenses and scheduled principal payments on debt, were as follows:

As part of the Organization's liquidity management, it has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due. To help manage unanticipated liquidity needs, the Organization has a committed line of credit of \$250,000, which it could draw upon. As of June 30, 2021, \$184,311 has been drawn on this line, leaving \$65,689 available.

NOTE 5 NET ASSETS WITHOUT DONOR RESTRICTIONS

The Organization's net assets without donor restrictions are comprised of undesignated and Board designated amounts for the following purposes at June 30:

NOTE 6 DONATED FACILITIES

Respective Solutions Group, Inc. operated in eight (8) school districts for the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, respectively (with a central management office and Family Center located within one of the school districts) and utilizes their buildings under month-to-month agreements. The districts donate the use of these buildings. The approximate fair value of the annual rent was \$572,400 and \$572,400 for the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, respectively, and is included in revenues and expenditures in the statements of activities.

NOTE 7 FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSES

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities. The statements of functional expenses present expenses by function and natural classification. Expenses directly attributable to a specific functional area of the Organization are reported as expenses of those functional areas while indirect costs that benefit multiple functional areas have been allocated among the various functional areas based on the programs and supporting services benefited.

NOTE 8 CONCENTRATIONS

The 21st Century grants accounted for eighty-five percent (85%) and seventy-seven percent (77%) of total revenue for the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, respectively. If a significant reduction in this level of funding were to occur, it could have an adverse effect on the Organization's programs and activities. There is a contract in effect which extends this funding through June 30, 2024.

NOTE 9 LEASES

In June 2019, the Organization signed a one-year operating lease agreement for a location in Ebensburg Pennsylvania. This lease requires a \$3,456 annual rental payment. The lease expired June 30, 2020, and was renewed for an additional year at the same terms.

In July 2019, the Organization signed a one-year operating lease agreement for a location in Gettysburg Pennsylvania. The lease requires monthly payments of \$1,198 per month. The lease expired June 30, 2020, and was renewed for an additional two (2) years at the same terms.

For the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, the Organization incurred lease expenses of \$17,832 and \$19,638, respectively.

NOTE 10 RELATED PARTY

The Organization is related to two (2) entities. The Organization pays a monthly fee to a company for consulting and accounting services; a board member is the owner and president of the consulting company. For the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, the charges for such services were \$27,419 and \$19,163, respectively.

Beginning in January 2018, the Organization provides the Center for Youth and Community Development (CFYCD) with the services of an executive director. These services are provided by the Organization's Executive Director. CFYCD reimburses the Organization for the Executive Director's real time and benefits and time dedicated to performing tasks on behalf of CFYCD based on an hourly rate and then bills CFYCD a monthly management fee based on the hours incurred by the Organization's Executive Director. The Organization has one (1) common board member with CFYCD. For the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, the amounts billed for such services were \$117,041 and \$106,874, respectively.

NOTE 11 RETIREMENT

The Organization has an established Simple IRA under Section 408(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. Full-time employees are eligible for participation in the plan. Respective Solutions Group, Inc. will match contributions up to three percent (3%) of eligible participants' voluntary contributions. For the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, Respective Solutions Group, Inc.'s contributions to eligible participants' IRAs were \$8,179 and \$7,930, respectively.

NOTE 12 RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the coronavirus (COVID-19) a pandemic. Respective Solutions Group, Inc. has continued operations within rigid guidelines aimed at halting the spread of the virus. The extent of the impact on the Organization's operational and financial performance will depend on certain developments, including the duration and spread of the outbreak, and impact on its members, employees, and vendors, all of which are uncertain and cannot be predicted. The Organization is monitoring the evolving situation and adapting operations and decision making as necessary.

NOTE 13 SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Subsequent events have been evaluated through December 6, 2021, the date that financial statements were available to be issued. Respective Solutions Group, Inc. is not aware of any subsequent events which would require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.
